TITLE IX CELEBRATES BIRTHDAY -PASSED JUNE 23, 1972

Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972, was renamed in 2002 as the [Patsy T. Mink Equal Opportunity in Education Act](#) in honor of its principal author. Rep. Mink, represented Hawaii and was the first woman elected from her State, the first Asian American and woman of Color elected to the US House of Representatives.

As we celebrated the accomplishments of all women in March during Women's History Month, it is with great honor that we recognize the mother of Title IX, Representative Mink.

Title IX, more than anything has changed the education opportunities for girls and women, and thereby impacted many areas of women's lives. When I was at WSU there were many restrictions on women, shut out of Colleges and Universities, Educational programs, the military/schools, and sports. More importantly women and girls were cut out of funding opportunities and jobs. Compounded by discrimination on the basis of race, it took a brave Congresswoman to lead one of the most profound pieces of legislation in the 1970's. What a change as we watch the examples of women today. May we remember our foremothers like Patsy Mink who opened the doors of US Education.
